We are waiting to hear the feedback and results but we will keep you all informed when we have any further knowledge.

TRAINING COURSES

Card Making

Taking place on the third Saturday of each month, Card Making is a great way to get creative with other people, making cards and maybe make some friends. Registration essential.

OfQual Certified Paediatric First Aid

This course is suitable for people who need to be qualified in first aid as they care for babies and children at home or in a professional setting. It covers a range of topics such as but not limited to - how to help a baby or child who is unresponsive and not breathing, choking, bleeding, burns and sickness.

Registration essential. There is a small exam on the last evening - students will then be awarded with an Ofqual certification.

Wednesday 22nd, Thursday 23rd & Friday 24th March (6-10PM)

Please note, attendance is required at all three evenings to complete certificate.

£70.00 full course (concession available)

OfQual Certified Emergency First Aid

Through this course, students will learn skills such as how to examine a casualty, familiarize themselves with basic life support and learn how to control bleeding and trauma. Students will learn the skills to overcome a potentially threatening situation long enough for medically trained individuals to arrive on scene. Other essential first aid skills are taught such as treating burns and scalds as well as assisting a choking individual. Registration essential.

Given all the demonstrations have been carried out successfully, students will be awarded with an Ofqual certification.

TRAINING COURSES

BSL Level 1 - Spring Offer 2023

This BSL level 1 course is for those who wish to learn BSL in order to communicate with BSL users, such as friends, relatives, colleagues, or customers, or want to progress to more advanced study and/or employment using BSL in the future. The level 1 course can be taken without any previous BSL experience at any level. This qualification allows learners to gain basic skills and confidence in the two areas of production and reception of BSL.

Course begins Monday 3-5:30PM beginning 27th March £350 for full course including exams (can be spread over the course)

Makaton Level 1

Makaton is a unique language programme that uses symbols, signs and speech to enable people to communicate. It supports the development of essential communication skills such as attention and listening, comprehension, memory, recall and organisation of language and expression.

With Makaton, signs are used, with speech, in spoken word order. This helps provide extra clues about what someone is saying. Using signs can help people who have no speech or whose speech is unclear. Using symbols can help people who have limited speech and those who cannot, or prefer not to sign.

Their Christmas preparations were outstanding and provided them with a special opportunity to celebrate the meaning of Christmas and enjoy the Christmas spirit as a school community, experiencing a real family atmosphere. They are very fortunate to have a great school hall and stage with a backdrop beautifully decorated by Margaret and Kerri, which allowed them to perform two amazing Christmas Shows. The children were fantastic in their rehearsals and what shows they produced. As a school community, they are extremely proud of each child, as they showcased their many talents. All they ever want for their children is to 'Be the best they can be!' and they have no doubt these experiences will have further developed their self-

confidence.





P4-7 pupils completed an Action Mental Health Workshop. The workshop provided the children with the opportunity to identify their emotions and through drama, games and art, gave them the opportunity to build a toolbox of strategies to improve their self-esteem and self-motivation. P1-3 will work with Action Mental Health during March 2023.

Open night was held on Tuesday 6 December for all pupils, past, present and future. This was an opportunity for the school community to re-engage. Pupils completed art activities, created animations, and enjoyed playing with the many resources within school. A visit to Santa's Grotto added an extra surprise.





P1-5 visited The Elf Emporium, The Junction Antrim. The excitement of a school trip was such an amazing experience for our younger pupils. The magical environment within the Elves Workshop and Snow Dome added a special Christmas feeling. A whole school visit to Jack and the Beanstalk on Wednesday 21 December provided many of the pupils with their first experience of a Christmas Panto. The buzz, excitement and the Christmas feeling was contagious.

The Roots of Empathy programme connects with the vulnerability of a baby who visits a class throughout the year with their parent and a trained Roots of Empathy Instructor. Through guided observation, the children label the baby's feelings and intentions, learning the affective aspect of empathy (emotion) and the cognitive aspect of empathy (perspective-taking) and in turn developing emotional literacy in themselves.

P6&7 took part in a live online Izak 9 workshop, joining 90 other schools to complete Izak 9 challenges. Creative teamwork and mathematical knowledge allowed them to successfully solve the mathematical problems.

Thinking Outdoors is a programme created by Jan White. It allows Foundation and Key Stage 1 pupils the opportunity to connect with nature, use natural materials and their natural environment to take notice of their world and learn their literacy and numeracy outdoors.

- Spar (New Street)


